

## **Etched Wine Bottle Wind Chime!**

STEP 1. Cut a glass bottle with Joe.

STEP 2. Glass Etching with etchall®

- 1 Using Brother International Corporation's ScanNCut electronic cutting machine, cut the design from etchmask™.
- 2 While the stencil is still on the mat, "weed" areas of the design that are to be etched.
- 3 Cover the design with a piece of etchmask transfer paper. Use the squeegee to make sure the transfer paper is firmly in place, then remove the stencil with its backing sheet from the mat.
- 4 Place the bottle on a flat surface. Use a cloth rolled on each side to prevent the bottle from rolling.
- 5 Remove the backing sheet from the stencil then place the stencil onto the bottle. Press firmly in place with the squeegee, then remove the transfer paper. Use extra pieces of etchmask and pieces of the transfer paper around the outer edges of the stencil. Fold up on either side, so the cream doesn't run onto an area you don't want to etch.
- 6 Pour the cream onto the stencil, using the squeegee to spread evenly over the areas to be etched. Let sit for 15 minutes.
- 7 Scrape the cream off the stencil back into the etchall crème container. This product is re-usable!
- 8 Rinse the stencil thoroughly in water. DO NOT rinse over a porcelain or ceramic sink, or it will remove the glaze.
- 9 Remove then stencil, using a scraper if necessary.
- 10 Rub dry with a soft cloth.

etchall® etching products will etch both clear and colored glass beautifully!

STEP 3. Joe will assemble the wind chime.
