

Powertex[©] Meerkats

<u>Materials</u>

- Empty roll of aluminum foil 10"-12" or smooth foam tube of 1 ½"
- Polystyrene ball 1"
- Aluminum foil
- Masking tape
- Powertex© Blue grey (lead color) 1kg
- Powertex© Stone Art 250g
- Powertex© Pigment colors Mocha, Yellow Ochre and White
- Powertex© Easy Varnish
- 1/2" paintbrush
- 2 black pearl pins for the eyes
- Black paint
- disposable gloves
- disposable plastic containers to mix in
- electricity wire or armature wire : 2 x 12" : paws
 1 x 13" : arms
 1 x 13" : tail
- Some pieces of fabric (cotton strips) +- 6 of 2" x 20"
- plastic to protect surface
- sharp knife

It is always recommended to do some research before starting an animal project. Learning about the habitat and lifestyle will make you get a feeling for your project. It will help you to bring your animal (Meerkat in this case) to life and to give each of them 'personality'.

INSTRUCTIONS





- 1. Protect your work with plastic as Powertex© adheres to almost anything but plastic.
- 2. Fill the empty aluminum foil tube with aluminum foil and attach the Styrofoam ball on top.
- 3. Use foil to shape the head and nose and add more shape to the body.
- 4. The Meerkats in the picture are about 13" when finished.
- 5. For the hind legs (5 $\frac{1}{2}$ " of length) : bend the two 12" wires to form the hips and the feet. Shape with aluminum foil (see picture). Cover with masking tape and afix them onto the body.
- 6. The other wire of 13" is used for the front legs (arms). Tape it around the neck and bring them in position. Use a folded sheet of aluminum foil to shape the arms. Do not make them too thick since a layer of clay has to be added and you do not want them out of proportion. The shoulders should have a width of about 3".



- 7. Use some aluminum foil to shape the tail, wrap very tight and tape it onto the body.
- 8. It is important to have a sturdy base! This means wrap the foil real tight and tape everything well with masking tape.
- 9. Put on your disposable gloves.
- 10. Dip the strips of cotton into the Powertex© lead, wring out. Wrap the tail, arms and feet, starting by the end. When applying a thin layer of Stone Art clay in the next step, some of these folds will still be visible, which gives a nice texture.
- 11. Mix equal amounts of Powertex© lead with Stone Art using a spatula and keep adding Stone Art powder until you get a kind of smooth bread dough. Knead well with your hands until it does not stick anymore to your hands. When too sticky, add more Stone Art - when too dry, add some more Powertex.
- 12. Cover your Meerkat with a coat of Powertex, which will help to 'glue' the clay. You can use your fingers as paintbrush for this part. Keep in mind that Powertex is a



hardener; you can use a paint brush but you do have to clean it immediately after use.

- 13. Cover your Meerkat with a layer (no thicker than 1/5") of this Stone Art clay. Use your finger and Powertex to smooth it out when necessary to prevent lines and cracks.
- 14. Use this clay to finish shaping the nose, nostrils, the ears and feet.



- 15. Wherever you already wrapped it with fabric, just add a very thin layer.
- 16. Use a knife to make cuts for toes and fingers.
- 17. Dry brush the Meerkat with the color pigments and Easy Varnish, starting with Mocha, Yellow Ochre and finally White for the front.
- 18. Use some black for the nose, ears, eyes and nails.
- 19. Press black pins for eyes.
